October 25-27, 2004. Symposium/Workshop on Conservation and Management of Mongolian Gazelles. Sponsored by the Wildlife Conservation Society, USAID, UNDP-GEF ESBP, WWF, The Convention on Migratory Species, and the Mongolian Academy of Sciences

The Mongolian steppe is the world's largest remaining intact temperate grassland. One of the world's last great migratory wonders, the Mongolian gazelle (*Procapra gutturosa*), still lives on the steppe in numbers that may exceed a million animals. Yet uncontrolled poaching and poorly planned development schemes now threaten the

Mongolian gazelle and the steppe ecosystem. In order to focus attention and develop specific solutions to these problems, an international three-day symposium/workshop will be held in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia.

The main goal of this meeting will be to create recommendations that will ensure long-term sustainable gazelle management. A one-day scientific symposium will discuss recent, on-going, and needed Mongolian gazelle research findings that are critical to inform management decisions, including population size, trends, breeding biology, migration, modeling as a management tool, and the creation of an international Mongolian Gazelle Working Group. This will be followed by a twoday workshop focusing on development and land use issues; legal protection and enforcement; and protected areas and transboundary cooperation with China and Russia, including the potential for creating one or more international gazelle peace parks. Outputs will be a set of recommendations that together will form the framework for a Mongolian Gazelle Management Plan. Keynote Speaker: Dr. George Schaller.
